Title 27, Article 7: No Significant Risk Levels and Article 9: Miscellaneous

§ 25705. Specific Regulatory Levels Posing No Significant Risk

(a) Daily exposure to a chemical at a level which does not exceed the level set forth in subsections (b), (c) and (d) for such chemical shall be deemed to pose no significant risk within the meaning of Section 25249.10(c) of the Act.

(b) Levels of exposure deemed to pose no significant risk may be determined by the lead agency based on a risk assessment conducted by the lead agency pursuant to the guidelines set forth in Section 25703, or a risk assessment reviewed by the lead agency and determined to be consistent with the guidelines set forth in Section 25703.

(1) The following levels based on risk assessments conducted or reviewed by the lead agency shall be deemed to pose no significant risk:

Acrylonitrile	0.7

Urethane	0.7
<u>Vinyl acetate</u>	<u>11</u>
Vinyl chloride	3

§ 25901. ~~Methods of Detection.~~ ~~[Repealed]~~ Vinyl acetate

To provide the Attorney General with factual information sufficient to establish the basis of a certificate of merit, as required by Health and Safety Code section 25249.7(d), a private party alleging exposure to vinyl acetate must provide facts showing exposure to the listed vinyl acetate monomer, CAS no. 108-05-4. If such factual information includes the concentration of vinyl acetate monomer in a product, that concentration must not include the amount of vinyl acetate monomer resulting from the breakdown of vinyl acetate-containing polymers in a manner which would not otherwise occur during a consumer product exposure, as defined in Cal. Code Regs., tit. 27, section 25600.1.
